How does viewing marriage as a covenant rather than a contract change your perspective on commitment and the challenges that relationships face?


SERMON QUOTE:

In what specific ways can your family (whether current or future) become a positive influence that ripples outward into your community and beyond?


SERMON QUOTE:

DEVOTIONAL:

How can you embrace God's design for your role (whether as a husband, wife, or future spouse) while celebrating the equal worth and value of both men and women?


SERMON QUOTE:

What would it look like for you to love the important people in your life more intentionally, sacrificially, and redemptively, following Christ's example?


SERMON QUOTE:
