



## DAY 1: HOW BIG IS YOUR GOD?

### DEVOTIONAL:

Naaman was a man who had everything the world could offer - power, prestige, wealth, and military victories. Yet despite all his accomplishments, he faced a problem that no earthly achievement could solve: leprosy. His impressive resume couldn't heal his diseased body or calm his fearful heart. How often do we fall into the same trap? We measure our worth by our achievements, our bank accounts, or our social status, only to discover that life's deepest challenges require something beyond our human capabilities. The most successful people can still feel empty, broken, or desperate for something they cannot earn or buy. Naaman's story reminds us that no matter how impressive our earthly credentials might be, we all need something greater than ourselves. We need a God who is bigger than our problems, stronger than our circumstances, and more powerful than our limitations. The question isn't whether you're successful by the world's standards - it's whether you recognize your need for the One who created and sustains all things. This Christmas season, as we celebrate the birth of Jesus, we're reminded that God came to earth not for the powerful and self-sufficient, but for those who recognize their desperate need for Him. Whether you're at the top of your game or struggling to get by, the invitation is the same: come to the One whose power transcends every earthly limitation.

### BIBLE VERSE:

"Now Naaman was commander of the army of the king of Aram. He was a great man in the sight of his master and highly regarded, because through him the Lord had given victory to Aram. He was a valiant soldier, but he had leprosy." - 2 Kings 5:1

### REFLECTION QUESTION:

What achievements or possessions do you sometimes rely on for security, and how might recognizing God's greatness change your perspective on what truly matters?

### SERMON QUOTE:

"Many a person who is smart, well to do, wealthy, powerful and well known has a very small view of our very big God."

### PRAYER:

Lord, help me to see beyond my earthly accomplishments and recognize my deep need for You. Expand my understanding of Your greatness and power. May I find my security not in what I've achieved, but in who You are. Amen.

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## DAY 2: SMALL PEOPLE, BIG PURPOSE

### DEVOTIONAL:

In Naaman's household lived an unnamed Jewish slave girl who would change the course of history. She had every reason to be bitter - torn from her homeland, forced into slavery, serving the very people who had destroyed her life. Yet instead of harboring resentment, she chose compassion. When she saw her master's suffering, she spoke up with hope: there was a prophet in Israel who could heal him. This young girl's story challenges our assumptions about significance. She had no title, no wealth, no social standing. Her name isn't even recorded in Scripture. Yet her simple act of faith and kindness set in motion events that would lead to a powerful man's healing and conversion. She understood something profound: God doesn't need impressive credentials to use someone mightily. Perhaps you feel overlooked, unimportant, or insignificant in the grand scheme of things. Maybe you think your voice doesn't matter or that you have nothing valuable to offer. The slave girl's story says otherwise. God delights in using ordinary people to accomplish extraordinary things. Your simple act of kindness, your word of encouragement, your willingness to point someone toward hope - these seemingly small gestures can have eternal impact. This Christmas, remember that God chose to enter the world not through a palace, but through a humble stable. He continues to work through humble hearts willing to be used by Him.

### BIBLE VERSE:

"Now bands of raiders from Aram had gone out and had taken captive a young girl from Israel, and she served Naaman's wife." - 2 Kings 5:2

### REFLECTION QUESTION:

How might God want to use your current circumstances, even if they seem insignificant or difficult, to impact someone else's life for His glory?

### SERMON QUOTE:

"Small people play a big role in God's kingdom. She's not even named, a teenage girl, and yet she plays a big role in God's kingdom."

### PRAYER:

Father, thank You for using ordinary people like me to accomplish Your purposes. Help me to see opportunities to show Your love and point others to You, regardless of my circumstances. Use my life, however small it may seem, for Your glory. Amen.

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## DAY 3: WHEN GOD OFFENDS OUR EXPECTATIONS

### DEVOTIONAL:

When Naaman finally reached the prophet Elisha, he expected a grand ceremony worthy of his status. Surely the healing of such an important man would require elaborate rituals, impressive displays of power, or at least a personal audience with the prophet. Instead, Elisha didn't even come out to meet him. Through a messenger, he simply said: "Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored." Naaman was furious. This wasn't how healing was supposed to work! The rivers of Damascus were far superior to the muddy Jordan. Why couldn't he wash there instead? His pride was deeply offended by the simplicity and apparent insignificance of God's prescription. God's ways often offend our human logic and expectations. We want healing to come through impressive means that make sense to us. We prefer solutions that affirm our intelligence, status, or worthiness. But God's methods are designed to humble us, not impress us. His power is often displayed through the simple, the ordinary, the unexpected. The gospel itself is offensive to human pride. The idea that we cannot earn our salvation, that we must simply receive it as a gift through faith in Jesus, challenges our desire to contribute something significant to our own rescue. Yet this is precisely how God works - through grace that humbles our pride and reveals His glory. This Christmas, are you willing to let God work in ways that might not make sense to you?

### BIBLE VERSE:

"Elisha sent a messenger to say to him, 'Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored and you will be cleansed.'" - 2 Kings 5:10

### REFLECTION QUESTION:

What expectations about how God should work in your life might be preventing you from receiving what He wants to give you?

### SERMON QUOTE:

"Sometimes God offends the mind in order to win the heart."

### PRAYER:

Lord, forgive me for the times I've been offended by Your simple ways. Help me to trust Your methods even when they don't make sense to me. Humble my pride and open my heart to receive Your grace in whatever way You choose to give it. Amen.

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## DAY 4: THE POWER OF COMPLETE OBEDIENCE

### DEVOTIONAL:

Naaman's servants approached him with wisdom that would save his life: "My father, if the prophet had told you to do some great thing, would you not have done it? How much more, then, when he tells you, 'Wash and be cleansed'?" Their logic was irrefutable. Swallowing his pride, Naaman went to the Jordan and began to dip. One dip - nothing. Two dips - still leprous. Three, four, five, six dips - no change. Imagine the thoughts racing through his mind. Was this all a cruel joke? Had he humiliated himself for nothing? But then came the seventh dip, and everything changed. His flesh was restored like that of a young boy. Complete healing came only with complete obedience. This principle echoes throughout Scripture and life: partial obedience is disobedience. God's instructions aren't suggestions we can modify to suit our preferences. When He says seven, six won't do. The blessing, the breakthrough, the healing often comes at the point of complete surrender to His will. Many of us struggle with this during the Christmas season and beyond. We want to follow God, but on our terms. We'll go partway, but not all the way. We'll obey in the areas that feel comfortable, but resist where His commands challenge our pride or preferences. Yet God's best for us requires our complete trust and obedience. The good news is that God's commands aren't burdensome - they're pathways to freedom, healing, and blessing.

### BIBLE VERSE:

"So he went down and dipped himself in the Jordan seven times, as the man of God had told him, and his flesh was restored and became clean like that of a young boy." - 2 Kings 5:14

### REFLECTION QUESTION:

In what area of your life might God be calling you to move from partial obedience to complete surrender, trusting that His way is best?

### SERMON QUOTE:

"When God says seven, six won't do."

### PRAYER:

God, I confess that I sometimes want to obey You halfway, keeping control over the areas that feel risky or uncomfortable. Give me the courage to trust You completely and obey fully, knowing that Your commands lead to life and blessing. Amen.

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## DAY 5: BEFORE WHOM DO YOU STAND?

### DEVOTIONAL:

After his healing, Naaman's transformation was complete - not just physically, but spiritually. He declared, "Now I know that there is no God in all the world except in Israel." His encounter with God's power had changed everything. He now understood before whom he truly stood. Naaman's journey from pride to humility, from self-reliance to God-dependence, mirrors the Christmas story itself. Just as Naaman had to recognize his desperate need and humble himself to receive healing, we must recognize our spiritual condition and humble ourselves before the Christ child who came to save us. The question that echoes through Naaman's story is the same one we face this Christmas: Before whom do you stand? Do you stand before your achievements, your reputation, your own understanding? Or do you stand before the God who created the universe yet chose to enter it as a baby in Bethlehem? Recognizing before whom we stand changes everything. It transforms our perspective on success and failure, on problems and possibilities. When we truly understand that we stand before the God who loves us enough to send His Son, who has power over every disease and difficulty, who offers complete healing and forgiveness - everything else falls into proper perspective. This Christmas, may you experience the same transformation Naaman did. May you discover the joy of standing humbly before the One who can wash away every sin and make you completely whole.

### BIBLE VERSE:

"Then Naaman and all his attendants went back to the man of God. He stood before him and said, 'Now I know that there is no God in all the world except in Israel.'" - 2 Kings 5:15

### REFLECTION QUESTION:

As you reflect on this Christmas season, how does recognizing that you stand before the God who became flesh in Jesus Christ change your perspective on your current circumstances?

### SERMON QUOTE:

"It is learning and knowing before whom you stand. Whom do you stand before? This Christmas, you stand before Him."

### PRAYER:

Lord Jesus, thank You for coming to earth to offer complete healing and salvation. Help me to stand humbly before You, recognizing Your power and love. Transform my heart as You transformed Naaman's, and may I live each day knowing before whom I stand. Amen.

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
